# What's that cement post downtown? Answers abound

Last week we published a question by the marketing director at law firm Chain | Cohn | Stiles asking what a concrete pillar outside his offices at 18th Street and Chester Avenue was used for. We had no clue, and so asked readers what they knew.

We got a big response: more than a dozen emails and phone calls. We received several different answers, leading us to believe maybe the post has had more than one use.

But it's pretty clear what one use has been given the number of people who offered up the answer and who they are.

"I believe it used to hold a small USPS letter mailbox," wrote in Stephen Montgomery, whom The Californian frequently taps for local history.

Five other people answered the same, including Shirley Prigmore, who made a special trip downtown to check out the post before giving her two cents. (Love that.)

"I looked around and inspected it," said Prigmore, who noticed red and blue markings on the post. "And I said, 'A ha! Mailbox.'"

Ed Ariey, a former policeman whose beat was downtown, gave



the same answer.

"I can see the mailbox sitting up there," said Ariey, who was born and raised in Bakersfield and turns 80 on Christmas Day.

We got some other interesting answers. Three people said the post was probably used back in the day to tie up horses.

"The iron rings buried in the concrete curbs were used to tie horses up," reader Michael McAlister wrote in. "I believe the short concrete posts were used to tie up a team of horses that pulled a surrey or

'I remember Charlie Dodge and my dad leaving their horses tied to some rings on the north side of Brock's department store while they went Christmas shopping. It sure befuddled the meter reader! When they found out who Charlie and my dad were (retired Kern County sheriff and my dad was on the sheriff's posse), they quickly canceled their tickets! Heh! Heh!'

Others discounted the notion the post was used to tie up horses.

And then there's Roger Steelman, a local architectural design draftsman, who thought the post was a surveyors boundary monument "used to locate a point on a lot, tract or parcel of real property also called a surveyors bench mark."

We shouldn't discount it. Here's a description of one type of surveyors monument on the website eHow.com:

"Stone obelisks are frequently used as survey monuments. Once set in place, they

are inscribed with the date of placement as well as the latitude and longitude. If made of a heavy stone such as granite and left undisturbed, this type of survey monument will last for centuries."

Sure enough, the post at Chester and 18th has "1950" inscribed on it. Was it a surveyors monument before a mailbox was affixed to it? Could be. We didn't see a latitude and longitude inscribed.

Whatever the answer, this was a fun question and thanks to everyone who weighed in.

#### Q: What is the purpose of the large hole being dug on the southeast corner of 24th and Oak streets?

A: The City of Bakersfield is expanding the capacity of the stormwater retention basin on the southwest corner of 24th and Oak, said Public Works Director Nick Fidler. The expansion will help alleviate potential flooding within the downtown area, he said.
